I am learning a lot that I never knew. I'm learning how to do fractions, proportions, division and expressions. I am thankful for my teacher, Amy, for actually sitting with me and taking the time to help me understand problems in my workbooks.

I am not sure what I want to do after I finish HSE. I've never really thought about it. I think I'll use my diploma to get a better job. Though I like working at the job I've got now, maybe I would like to get better pay.

I want to pass HSE and move forward with

my future. I will miss the class when I graduate because my teachers were nice; they let you know how good a job you're doing and push you to make goals and achieve them.

Update: Ambre passed the high school equivalency (HSE) exam in January 2021. She is currently looking into opportunities at a local community college and is excited about her new prospects.

Impact Update

As we enter into the last half of our program year, we are pleased to share that The Literacy Alliance is trending very positively compared to last year, as well as to the state, in terms of the success metrics we measure. Our students are making more measurable skills gains than last year (69% this year compared to 58% last year) and our average is higher than the state's (69% compared to the state's 55%). And 43% of our students have attained their HSE, compared to 28% last year and 25% for the state this year. Most impressively, 89% of our students take part in some form of distance learning compared to 74% last year and 37% for the state this year. Our staff is dedicated to student success!
